The annual Kossuth/Palo Alto County Economic Development Corporation Intern Breakfast marked the beginning of another exciting year of the internship program, hosted by K/PACEDC on Wednesday, May 28th. This year's keynote speaker, Kyle Norris, Executive Dean of Iowa Lakes Community College, centered his message on the theme of being BOLD.

Norris challenged attendees with the thought-provoking question, "Are you a noun or a verb", encouraging interns to actively seek out opportunities rather than remain fixed in their professional journey. He emphasized the importance of embracing risks by saying 'YES' first and figuring things out along the way.

In closing, Norris shared three BOLD risks for professional growth, including don't count yourself out before you start, accept a setback, and embrace discomfort. Overall, his message to the interns was clear, to make the most out of opportunities that come their way.

After the presentation concluded, Career Intern Committee member and ILCC Board of Trustee, Bob Jennings, attested to Norris' message, verifying the value of seizing every opportunity by saying 'YES'. Brianna Marso, HR Director at Iowa State Bank and committee member, elaborated the professional advantages of the Intern Program. She described the upcoming events and skill-building sessions designed for the benefit of the interns. Secrets to Sucess

On June 10th, 2025, the Kossuth/Palo Alto County interns welcomed International Speaker Brenda Clark-Hamilton, MA Ed, for her "Look the Part, Be the Part: Success Through Your Professionalism" Program. Clark-Hamilton is a keynote speaker and workplace trainer on various topics including Motivational Keynotes, Leadership Development, Professional Development, Women's Conferences/Events, and Young Adult Conferences/Events. In her Secrets to Success Presentation, she showcased the importance of business etiquette. Three key aspects Clark-Hamilton talked through included professional appearance, behaviors, and attitude. Brenda Clark-Hamilton stressed the importance of projecting an image that is positive and welcoming to individuals in the workplace

She also emphasized what you wear affects the type of impression an individual makes on an employer. Wearing the appropriate attire to work as well as respectable grooming and posture shows employers that you as an individual are confident and competent. In addition, Clark-Hamilton discussed professional behaviors with the interns. Such professional behaviors include having strong communication skills, whether it is returning phone calls and emails promptly or listening and following through with tasks given. Likewise, professional behaviors include not being involved with gossip in the work area or checking personal social media platforms. It is important to always represent yourself with good character and manners at work and in the community.

The Kossuth/Palo Alto interns had a unique opportunity to attend a professional development meeting focused on social media training on June 17 organized by Pharmacists Mutual. Emotional Intelligence/Personality Training

In a world that is driven by quick decisions and connections with others, true success does not just depend on what you know, but on how well you understand and manage emotions. Emotional intelligence has recently become a large element of leadership and influence. On Tuesday, June 24th, Alison VanOtterloo of Pharmacists Mutual spoke to interns about its growing importance, offering insights into how emotional intelligence can be applied in real-life situations and future careers. Together, she and the interns explored how to recognize, regulate, and respond to emotions. Understanding how to navigate themselves and other individuals' emotions is key to building strong relationships, navigating social dynamics, and making sound decisions under pressure. Individuals with high emotional intelligence often excel as communicators, collaborators, and adaptable professionals. It's a skill that can elevate performance in both personal and professional areas.

To bring these concepts to life, VanOtterloo led the interns through a hands-on presentation with a guided worksheet focused on reframing mindsets and reinterpreting everyday interactions. For many, this was their first deep dive into emotional intelligence, and K/PACEDC interns left equipped with practical strategies to apply.

This session gave attendees valuable insight into how they can apply emotional intelligence in their current internships and in future careers. Emotional awareness is crucial not only for recognizing stress or biases but for making well thought out decisions in high-stake situations. Overall, the tools and insights shared during the skill building session will help guide interns not only during their internships, but throughout their careers ahead.

Manage Your Money

On the morning of July 8th, interns took the opportunity to learn from lowa State Bank about the importance of managing a personal credit card and financials correctly. Shannon Goche, Meredith Huber, and Brianna Marso represented lowa State Bank at the Kossuth/Palo Alto County Economic Development office, ready to inform and answer questions. It was a very educational event, with the clearest takeaway being to always think about your future financial situation. Every financial action taken affects your big life decisions. If provided with the right knowledge, young professionals have the power to set themselves up as reliable and responsible debtors.

Interns learned that a high credit score is incredibly valuable with lasting impacts. It shows responsibility, accountability, and organization. When making large purchases, searching for loans, or sometimes even applying for jobs, a credit score will be a major determining factor. Iowa State Bank stressed the importance of being aware of that impact so that one can continuously be working to put themselves in a positive light on paper.



It was also highly recommended that as young people start their careers, they should discuss the future of their finances with their bankers, mainly to ensure that they are taking all the right steps to be successful.
